This program is sponsored by the USC U.S.-China Institute and the National Consortium for Teaching about Asia.



ASIAN LINKS: YESTERDAY, TODAY, AND TOMORROW

STUDY TOUR, SUMMER 2018 CHINA AND TAIWAN, JUNE 27 – JULY 13

APPLICATION DEADLINE: FEB. 13

Teachers who have successfully completed a minimum of 30 hours of NCTA-sponsored professional development programs are eligible to apply. Teachers who have previously participated in a NCTA-sponsored study tour are not eligible. In general it is our aim to choose teachers who made the most of earlier NCTA opportunities and who are likely to make effective classroom use of this trip. Teachers are required to pay a portion of the trip cost. Freeman Foundation and Taiwan government support make the trip possible. In addition to examining historical connections within and beyond Asia, the trip will examine China's belt and road ambitions and Taiwan's efforts to strengthen ties to Southeast Asia. Those completing all requirements are eligible for continuing education units.

EXPLORING EAST ASIAN VISUAL CULTURE

SUMMER INSTITUTE 2018, JULY 30 – AUGUST 3

This complimentary seminar will look at a variety of visual arts, including religious iconography, woodblock prints, political posters, music videos, film, and graphic novels. In addition to presentations, the seminar includes museum visits and optional outings to some of Los Angeles's "Asia Towns." Those completing all requirements are eligible for a stipend and USC continuing education units.

EAST ASIA SINCE 1800

MID-SEPTEMBER – EARLY NOVEMBER 2018

East Asia experienced enormous conflict and stunning political and economic transformations over the past two centuries. This complimentary seminar will provide teachers with a basic understanding of what changed and why and will explore effective ways to bring these stories and questions into Southern California classrooms. The 36-contact hour seminar meets on several Monday evenings (5 – 8 pm) and Saturdays (9 am–3:30 pm). Parking and most materials are provided. Those completing all seminar requirements earn a stipend and either LAUSD salary points or USC continuing education units.

NEW: ONLINE COURSE – THE UNITED STATES AND CHINA

SEPTEMBER 4 – NOVEMBER 9

This course, taught by Clayton Dube, USCI director, traces the complex and evolving U.S.-China relationship from the 18th century to today. The course will be useful to those teaching world history, U.S. history, world geography, economics, and comparative government. It is taught in two-week modules. Most of the work (reading, watching videos and presentations, responding via an online forum) is completed at the convenience of the participant. One hour is reserved every other Tuesday (4 pm Pacific) for online discussion. Those meeting all seminar requirements are eligible for USC continuing education units.
